

Hank retired from Kaiser Aluminum & Chemical Corporation in 1982 after 28 years with the firm. In his career with Kaiser, his positions included chief engineer of a major division; general purchasing manager; and project manager on the design, construction, and operation of numerous chemical plants around the world. He was maintenance superintendent in the largest aluminum reduction plant in the country; and he was operations manager at a major real estate development project in southern California.


the satisfaction he gained from these latter positions, as compared with those from the significant positions he held in the corporate world.

Most of the activities are now open. We only have seven that are still on hold, but hopefully they will open soon. Unfortunately, nine activities have closed due to lack of participation.



Uneventful as it was we finally arrived at our steel vehicles. A truly memorable ride. What's this "olde crap"??



The SIR 146 Book Group combined December and meetings because of the Covid outbreak, and six of the group met on-line via Zoom on January 10th, hosted by our latest iteration of

Zoom Masters, Paul Dubow.

John Kennedy Toole, a professor at Tulane University in New Orleans, the city home to the protagonist of the story, Ignatius J. Reilly. The book gets its title from a quote by Herman Melville that "when a true genius appears in the world, you may know him by the sign that the dunces are all in confederacy against him". However, Ignatius is not a "true genius" but rather an over-educated overweight buffoon who has no redeemable unforgiving qualities and believes he knows it all.

The story of the book is really two stories, one about the author, and the other about the story he wrote. The short story about the author is that after he wrote the book, he could not find a willing publisher, and became so discouraged he eventually committed suicide. His mother, who apparently was a very controlling person, found a copy of the manuscript, and hounded a friend of hers in the book business until he read it, liked it, and got it published, which led to the book getting the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction.

Ignatius lives at home with his mother in a section of New Orleans where the streets then were still gravel. mother waits on him hand and foot without appreciation and encourages him to get a job. He finds work, but he has a hard time holding down a "position." He basically creates chaos wherever he goes.

He meets and interacts with a wide range of New Orleans "characters," which is one reason to read the book, but the chief character is Ignatius. There is life size statue of Ignatius on Canal Street - he's famous!

He has a former (on-going?) girlfriend, Myrna Minkoff, a socialist/activist who lives in New York City and with whom he corresponds. He has only left New Orleans once, to study at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, but he lasts there only a few months. The highlights of his stay in Baton Rouge are meeting Myrna and writing a threatening letter (something that he was very good at) to a professor.


Ignatius' mother finally can't take it anymore, and commits

him to a state mental hospital. His girlfriend comes to New Orleans to rescue him, and as they drive away on their way back to NYC, they pass the ambulance coming to pick him up. He is off to NYC to raise havoc there.


We do not recommend this book to the SIR audience. It seems to be written for the "Literati" and those with a particular interest in New Orleans and, indeed, it paints a very good picture of the city. Tennessee Williams once said that there are only three cities in the US - New York, San Francisco, and New Orleans, all the rest are Cleveland. Our book this time was The Confederacy of Dunces, by (Cleveland is a more attractive city now than when Williams penned his remark.)
