If you have a buddy who might like to join in one or more of our activities, they can attend an activity 2 -3 times and check it out without joining SIR. When your buddies are ready to join SIR, you can sponsor them for a "free" lunch by emailing the Luncheon Chairman. Our newsletter, SIR-Call, says a lot about how much fun it is to be a SIR member. Please send them this-link to our recent newsletters so they can see for themselves.

In May, it was reported to the BEC that the State SIR is slowly exploring the possibility of admitting women as SIR members. Though half of our branch's 50 activities are coed, our By-Laws do not provide a mechanism for the BEC to approve spouse-only or companion-only activities. No changes to our branch's membership are being planned. The State SIR is also changing to "SIR" from "Sons in Retirement" and is distributing new logos and other marketing materials. There was some talk that the State SIR might drop the COVID Waiver requirement. At least for now, both COVID vaccination and a signed waiver are required to attend SIR activities.

The BEC is looking for a SIR member to be elected as a new First-year Director for Recruiting, which entails answering replies to our ads and posts from men who are expressing an interest in joining a SIR activity and determining if our activities are right for them, and also if they are a good fit for SIR. Basic computer skills like using email with attachments, using spreadsheets and word documents, and using a web browser are needed. Recruiting is the important first step on becoming a SIR. A good candidate may have joined SIR a few years ago and wants to help bring in new members and can attend the monthly BEC meetings.

Because of COVID, and the use of Zoom, the Branch has not been requiring attendance at our monthly (luncheon) meetings since March 2020. Currently an RSVP (opt-in) reservation is required to attend lunch. The question has arisen as to when the Branch should go back to the pre-COVID opt-out approach and reinstate the annual payer program. Since the December Holiday Luncheon is also a Ladies Day, November might be the last RSVP (Opt-in) luncheon, and the BEC will likely be asked to reinstate the opt-out approach and the annual payer program in January 2023.

We are very lucky to be able to have so many talented and friendly people in Branch 146. Thank you for supporting the branch and for creating the positive experiences that keep us coming back. Have a happy 4th of July!

The Branch Honors Vern Laursen With The Certicate of Appreciation And Senior Sir Awards!



Our first Honoree at the June 9th Luncheon was actually the recipient of two awards: the coveted "Branch Certificate of Appreciation" and the "Senior SIR" award for having reached 90 years of age on May 1, 2022. At this meeting, we discuss reaching "Senior SIR" status first. Being the bright guys that we all are, we have figured out that we are awarding the "Senior SIR" award today because we traditionally have not complicated the spirit of the Ladies Day luncheon in May with business matters such as Honoree Awards.

So history will report, **Verner Laursen's** parents (we call him "**Vern**") immigrated to the United States in 1929 and settled in Wisconsin. In 1932, they came to California to search for work and settled in Humboldt County where his mother happened to have an aunt. **Vern** was born in May 1932 in Eureka. He went to school in Scotia, but in the sixth grade, he was transferred to a one room school with about 14 children. **Vern** graduated from Fortuna High School and attended Humboldt State for two years. Subsequently, **Vern** transferred to U.C. Berkeley (I might add several decades

before Aaron Rodgers) and graduated with a degree in Forestry.

After graduation, **Vern** was drafted into the Army where he was a topographic surveyor stationed at the Presidio. He spent very little time in San Francisco because he was assigned to temporary duty in Iran. After his discharge, **Vern** worked for Simpson Timber Company in Arcata and Klamath. In 1961, there was a reduction in staff and **Vern** found work with PG&E in San Francisco in their land department as a right-of-way agent. He retired in 1987 as a supervising right-of-way agent. Since that time **Vern** has been a real estate consultant.

Vern joined our Branch on February 10, 2011. Over approximately 11 years, he has jumped in running and has worked hard in the two areas in which he has primarily participated . . . nine hole golf and Mac Computers. **Vern** has always presented himself in front of the Branch at our luncheons to share tidbits of information on either subject with his fellow Sirs to help them improve their performance. If everyone would become active like **Vern**, the job of leadership would be much easier.

The surprise activity for **Vern** and his friends has been genealogy. He is always looking for relatives, and often finding them in strange places. However, **Vern** found that his relatives in Denmark did not move very far from each other as most stayed in Denmark with three generations located in one parish.

On a personal note, in 1966, **Vern** married **Nadine Thompson**, who was also from Humboldt County. They lived in Redwood City and moved to Concord in 1968. They have two sons, **Eric** and **Dana**, and two grandchildren.

We congratulating **Vern** for the excellent work he has done for our Branch, and for reaching the age of 90!




When we grew up in the 1950's and early 1960's, the songstress on top of the music charts was probably Patsy Cline – one of the most influential talents of the mid-century. She was one of the first vocalists to successfully cross over from Country Music into Pop.

AREA 16 Fishing Report

As we have reported in earlier issues of the SIR-Call, this has been an unusual salmon season because sport fishing for salmon in the Bay Area was closed from June 1 to June 22. As a consequence, the party, charter, and private boats

that regularly fish for salmon in the ocean turned to fishing for halibut in the bay. At times, the fishing grounds resembled a boat marina with boats parked side to side fishing for the tasty flatfish. One would think that this over-fishing would limit the catch, but that was not the case. It turned out that this was the best halibut season in the bay

in years as nearly every outing ended with limits or near limits. Not only that, but the average size of the fish that were caught got bigger as the month progressed. Perhaps the happiest halibut fisherman of all was Paul Dubow. He was the fishmaster (the club member in charge of the trip) on two outings, one on the Scallywag and the other on the Sundance. On the Scallywag, seven of the 15 keepers were over ten pounds, with two of them over twenty pounds and Paul landed the largest one, which weighed in at 25 lbs. One week later, on the Sundance, Paul once again landed the largest fish, this one a mere 13.5 lbs. On the same trip, Brion Beetz caught two stripers and Paul caught a sand shark.

We did get one salmon trip in. It occurred on May 31, the last day of the first part of the season. Six of us

ventured out on the *Sundance* and returned with limits. Once again, a member of Branch 146 hooked the largest one, as **Lee Clark** boated a 25 pounder.

We also did a bit of rockfishing. **Ken Bellindir** limited on one trip and also picked up a very nice ling cod. **Brion Beetz** picked up seven, fishing on a friend's boat. **Carl Moyer** not only limited out, but five of his rockfish were cabezon, perhaps the best eating fish in the rockfish family, and the average size was five pounds.

Not all of us devoted our energies to salt water fishing, as quite a few fishermen had successful trout fishing adventures. **Carl Moyer** and **Gordon Linebaugh** fished in San Pablo Reservoir and hooked six golden trout among

their ten fish limit. Ray Pixton journeyed to Sunflower Lake, near Emigrant Gap in the Sierras, and caught a limit of rainbows. Jack Waddell caught four rainbows, fishing from shore at Los Vaqueros Reservoir. Steve Dyer also fished from shore, but at Lake Del Valle, where he landed two large rainbows. Don Arington of Branch 146 fly fished on the lower Sacramento where he caught and released many rainbows. **Pete Gates** of Branch 146 had an unusual experience on his annual trip to the middle fork of the Feather River. First, he was surprised that the river was very high. Second, after failing to catch anything by either fly or spin fishing, he and his companions turned to using worms and caught a bunch of trout. Pete probably has not worm fished for trout since his boyhood. Stan Wong was mildly disappointed on a two day trip to Lake Almanor. He only caught four rainbows in the two days. However, the

> last one gave him a furious fight, and even jumped over the outboard motors in the rear of the boat before he was able to net it.

> On the Delta, Mike Corker and Tom Kostik, our resident Delta experts, caught black bass and some small stripers. Phil Scimonelli fished the Antioch Pier and caught and released a large amount of undersized stripers. Phil reports that he always catches stripers on the pier but he has yet to catch a keeper there. However, the pier would be an excellent venue for a new fisherman or one of us who would like to take a grandchild fishing because action is virtually guaranteed.

All Branch 146 members are welcome to join our fishing outings and attend our monthly meetings. Our next meeting is on Thursday, July 28, at the Legends Bar and Grill at the Diablo Creek golf course

on Port Chicago Highway in Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30 am, but many of us gather at 7 am or thereafter for breakfast and/or fishing stories and so please join us at that time. You are also welcome, even if you have never fished before, to join us for our regular trips to San Pablo Reservoir and the Delta and in the Bay for halibut and the ocean for salmon and rockfish. In addition, we have three special events lined up. We have chartered the Sea Wolf for a rockfishing adventure to the Farallons on August 18. We are going to visit the Tsar Nicolau caviar farm, where sturgeon is farmed, after the September meeting. And we will be fishing in Lake Almanor for big rainbows on October 10-14. World War II, by Mary Jo McConahay, It is the story of them flourished. Latin America in World II, with some pre-war and post-war history included as well. The Allies and the Axis powers did go at it in Latin America. The region was filled with spies and counterspies, with Buenos Aries a particular hotbed.

The book was a slow starter but got better as one progressed through it. It seemed to combine both sociology and history into sort of a social studies textbook, and had many chapters about ordinary people as well as descriptions of historic events. We learned that Central and South America were sources of raw material necessary for the war effort such as rubber and oil, and that the US and Axis powers struggled to be the dominant country to control this production. This included an effort by the Ford Motor Company to develop a huge plantation in the Amazon to produce rubber, which was dubbed Fordlandia.

The book describes many facts about what happened in the various countries and to the people of the region that none of us (and probably most Americans) had not heard or known about. This included the 25,000 Brazilians who took part in the invasion of Italy and the 4,000 Japanese Peruvians who were interned in Crystal City, Texas and used as "trade bait" by the US to secure the release of American POW's. These people languished in Crystal City until 1947. Many ethnic Germans who had no connection with Nazi Germany were also rounded up at the strong urging of the US government.

Some chapters were devoted to stories about individuals and families in these regions and how they were not treated well by their governments and the US. The author discusses how Fascist governments arose in some of the countries. and how the Vatican, at least at the outset of the war, was complicit in some of the Nazi atrocities. One chapter is devoted to the fate of the ship St. Louis which carried Jewish refugees from Europe to presumed safety in the New World but was unable to debark its passengers in any Latin American country, a decision supported by the US government. The ship was forced to return to Europe, where many of its passengers wound up in Nazi death camps.
