
While you are phoning your friends, please keep in mind that if they are not Sirs, you should invite them to become members. We are looking into amending our rules about guests having to physically come to a

If you have read the Big Sir report from **Brad** in this issue, you are aware that we are aiming to have an all hands meeting at our regular scheduled meeting time on July 9th. I'll be searching for a

speaker who is comfortable talking and presenting using Zoom.

I want to address our move to Zoom as it seems to be the application of choice in holding meetings with other SIR branches and their members. Some of you have expressed your reservations about using Zoom and loading it on your computer or smartphone because of reported privacy concerns.

From December 2019 to March of this year, the number of people using Zoom jumped from 10 million to 200 million. Leading up to the pandemic, Zoom was a niche application that concentrated on supporting business to business meetings. The controls were made easy to use with little training, but the user base was thought to be professional centric. The fact that the program was offered free to anyone wanting to communicate in a meeting for 40 minutes or less made the program so attractive.

Zoom acted quickly with two upgrades in March and April to strengthen its security. These included 1) requiring a password to enter a meeting, 2) optionally force a participant to stop in a so-called "waiting room" before entering a meeting, 3) give the host who set up the meeting full control over participants' video and audio and the ability to shut them down immediately if needed, and, 4) higher level enhanced encryption.

Of course, no program is free from being hacked but your BEC and the SIR state organization now feels Zoom is safe to use for our meetings in the coming months. Unfortunately, If you decide to opt out or are unable to use Zoom, you will likely miss out on being able to participate in our meetings for the foreseeable future.

We are also working to build a socializing aspect into our future meetings similar to the 30 minutes we had before our in person luncheons. Look for an email giving you more details as we get closer to the date..

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

AREA 16 Fishing Report Paul Dubow

Fishing venues are starting to reopen, but one may need a Ph.D. to navigate through the different regulations as counties and public health departments come up with individual rules. For example, Berkeley, which has its own public

health department, will allow four packs to launch from its public ramp. However, nearby Emeryville, which is under the jurisdiction of the Alameda County Health Department, only permits boats to launch with a maximum of two, which can include only the boat owner and a member of the owner's family. Therefore, no charter boats are launching from Emeryville.

A similar problem exists for those of us who like to fish the Delta for sturgeon or stripers. Pittsburg and Martinez are our favored launch spots, but they are in Contra Costa County, which has the same restrictions as Alameda County. But we can cross the Nejedly Bridge and launch from Montezuma Slough in Solano County with non-family members aboard. There are no markers in the Delta depicting the county line. What happens when a boat with three non-related fishermen aboard hooks a sturgeon in Solano County and the fight takes the boaters into Contra Costa County? I guess the answer is that "it's complicated".

In the meantime, we have managed to do a bit of fishing. Rich Fiscina of Branch 146 and his son Andrew fished the Bay from Oyster Point to Alameda to Oakland to Angel Island to Richmond and they managed to land three keeper halibut, one close to 10 lbs. Phil Scimonelli, Brion Beetz, Mario Moratorio, and Joe Miscione social distanced from the shore for stripers and Phil caught a keeper. Tom Kostik and Mike Corker both fished the Delta for black bass without any luck. Carl Moyer sailed his boat out of Pacifica and caught some rockfish and a lingcod. However, there was no trout fishing because all the local reservoirs are closed.

We had our first Zoom meeting on April 23 and another is scheduled for May 28. Our June meeting is scheduled for June 27. We do not know at this point whether it will be on Zoom or at our usual hangout at Legends Bar and Grill at the Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. No matter what the locale, the meetings will begin at 8:30 am, but if we meet in person at Legends, breakfast will be available at 7:30 am.

Dining out started in a distant galaxy far far away. Like a dying star it lost its shine. It started with a different format, members hosted the dinners at a restaurant, on a rotating basis.

Before long, it was realized that one person should be in charge of the event. Some of the problems involved the process of picking restaurants, contacting the manager, and collecting money in a timely manner, which was a little overwhelming.

In 2013 it was recreated to what it is today. **Bruce Borgman** took over the event as activity chairman and schedules a dinner every other month.

When picking a restaurant, Bruce has to negotiate with the manager for a menu with a variety of entrees, and also an eye on the cost. Keeping the cost at \$50 is difficult and at times it has gone up to \$60. He also negotiates happy hour, wine, and corkage fees.

Corporations are harder to deal with than Darth Vader, but when dealing with owners it is easier because they are more flexible. Most times the chef will prepare a vegetarian meal if requested in advance. This activity is so popular that Bruce has 95 couples on the mailing list.

The restaurants that he selects must have a minimum at least 40 chairs with an area to socialize, and bar service. One night there were 82 diners at the function which made it too crowded. Twice he has had more requests then the restaurant can support, so he has split the dinner into two separate evenings. Then, he surveys the members to see what evening they would like to attend and make sure friends can be seated on the same evening. Fortunately, a fellow SIR member has volunteered to host the second night.

The function usually starts at 5:30 pm so we can enjoy happy hour. Diners pay in advance, and Bruce pays at the end with a credit card, then exchanges the diners' checks with the treasurer, with one made out to him which is then used to pay the credit card bill.

Bruce and Sue have been known to put a dinner in a takeout box and deliver it to the sick SIR member who paided for the dinner but could not attend. Finally, Bruce and Sue print name tags, hand them out when members enter the restaurant as they welcome each diner when they come in. I am getting tired just describing all the work he does for us, and he doesn't even get a free meal!

A big thank you to Bruce and Sue.

Since I have so much idle time on my hands, I've come up with additional possible theories for my empty Inbox.


- 1. Unable to comply with my three submittal criteria.





The SIR146 Book Group held its first on-line meeting via Zoom on Monday, the 18th, and we determined it was successful! We'll continue in June.

Zoom license and set up the meeting where six members of the group "attended."

We discussed the book chosen at our last "live" meeting, Citizens of London, which focuses on three Americans who played the most active roles in bringing the United States into World War II. These were John Winant, the incoming ambassador who replaced Joe Kennedy; Edward R. Murrow, the famous reporter who headed CBS News in Europe, and; Averell Harriman, whose job on paper was Administrator of the Lend-Lease Program for Britain, but did much more. The supporting cast included Winston Churchill and the Churchill family, as well as people like Eisenhower and Montgomery. All three were advocates of the US entering the war to save Britain and worked hard to convince a reluctant President to do so. The book was viewed as an inside look into London and its people during the war years, including the German bombing, or Blitz, the people who populated it, and revealed much about the important figures of this time in England. The book was written by Lynne Olsen, who has written several books about that period of time.

Our book selection for the next meeting is *East of Eden* by John Steinbeck. We spent quite a bit of time discussing him and the National Steinbeck Center and the former Steinbeck home, both in Salinas and near each other. Some of the group had been to these and had lunch in the home. Additional resources on John Steinbeck include *A Journey into Steinbeck's California* by Susan Shillinghaw, a former director of the Steinbeck Center. It covers his life, the places he lived, much of his social life, and his literary works, and as a bonus has great pictures. Another resource comes from the "Bookish" extra section the *East Bay Times* of Saturday, May 16th, which devotes several pages to Steinbeck's life and literary works.

Our next meeting, as of now to be held via Zoom, will be on Monday, June 15th, at 8:30 am.

History of the Hearts Game Bob West

Hearts is one of the top five most popular card games in Canada, and among the most widely played throughout the world. It is a trick-catching game,

but not like most in its genre. There is no trump to play to, and the idea is *not to catch tricks*, but to *avoid them* – especially any in the suit of Hearts and the dreaded Queen of Spades; aka 'Calamity Jane', or as the Brits call her, the 'Slippery Bitch'.

The game of Hearts has deep roots and a rich ancestral lineage that dates back (at least) to 17th century Europe. As we know the game now, it originated around 1850. Hearts rules were simple back then but evolved in the last hundred years or so.

Early History of Hearts

Hearts, along with a series of other anti-trick-catching card games, is believed to have been born from a much older game first known as Reversin and later called *Reversis*. The oldest known mention of Reversin, a standard 52-card game, was in 1601 France. French philologist Jean-Baptiste Bullet dates it back a bit further, theorizing that the game was invented during the reign of the Court of Francis I, who ruled France from 1515 to 1547.

Others believe the game originated in Spain, suggesting that it was first played with a traditional Spanish deck of 48 cards and counterclockwise rotation of play. More likely, the game originated in Italy, where a series of older, negative trick-catching games derive, including Tressete games like Rovescino, which is still popular in Italian culture today.

What we do know of the history of Reversis tells us it was a subtle, uncomplicated game. There were few rules, and few additions to the rules, up through the 18th century. Around 1750, 1 penalty point was gained by catching any trick, while capturing the J♥ or Q♥ earned an additional penalty point.

Evolution of Hearts Card Game

In the 19th century, as its popularity spread, more intricate rules came into play, intensifying competition between players. Additional penalty points were enforced, evolving into the first true version of Hearts. Catching any heart was worth 1 penalty point.



From this, another game called <u>Black Maria</u> evolved. The rules were the same as the original Hearts, except that capturing the Queen of Spades would penalize a player by as much as 13 points. Black Maria was so popular, that rule was universally adopted, and became the game of Hearts as we know it today.

Shortly after the Queen of Spades became the most dastardly of all cards to capture, a new rule known as 'Shooting the Moon' was introduced. This variation allowed players to gain a supreme advantage over their opponents by playing opposite the rules – capturing every penalty card. With each heart being worth 1 point, and the Queen of Spades worth 13, a player could impose a 26 point penalty on all of their opponents (or collect 26 positive points for themselves) by successfully shooting the moon.

In the last century, many more variations to the rules came about. Around 1920, the Jack of Diamonds became a positive 10-point card, although Canadian Hearts rules do not generally enforce it. Passing cards before the start of a hand, Breaking Hearts, leading 2 and 'Shooting the Foot' were more recent additions that caught on in most regions of the world.

In Canada, most learned to play at a young age, shuffling up around the table at home with family or even in grade school among students and friends. The popularity of Hearts surged once more in the 1990s when Microsoft included the game in its *Windows OS 3.11*+ software package (along with other games like Solitaire, Free Cell and Minesweeper).

Over the next few decades, the internet gave birth to online Hearts games, where players can compete against others from all over the world. Internet Hearts games continue to 'capture the hearts' of Canadian players, with free time to play games, and even real money Hearts games and tournaments are readily available.

Sir 146 MEN'S Hearts Bob West

We have played online twice in April and have been playing weekly in May. The first 4 May meetings are summarized below.

May 1st: We had two teams of 4 play on Friday May 1st.

<u>Group 1</u>: Participants were **Frank Lucas, Bob Finlayson, George Sabbagha** and **Bob West**.

Game 1:

The game was remarkably close thru 9 hands between Frank Lucas and Bob Finlayson, when Frank "shot the moon" on the last hand, winning with 43 points. Bob Finlayson was 2nd with 73 points.

<u>Game 2</u>: **Bob Finlayson** was ahead the whole game and ended the 11th hand by winning with only 34 points. **Bob West** came in 2nd with 65 points.

Game 3: George Sabbagha and Frank Lucas were nip and tuck thru the 5th hand when Bob West "shot the moon". However, it was still awfully close between George and Frank until Frank "shot the moon" in the 8th and final hand. Frank won with 58 points, and George was 2nd with 76 points.

<u>Game</u> 4: The game took 13 hands to finish which was tied for the longest game of the year. **Frank Lucas** and **Bob West** were close all the way when **Frank** "shot the moon" on the 13th and last hand. He had dealt to him the A, K, Q, J, 10 of hearts. **Bob West** was 2nd with 74 points.

<u>Group 2</u>: Participants were **Rich Lyon, Steve Ybarra, Ron Polivka** and **Ray Bland**.

<u>Game 1</u>: **Ray Bland** was in last place thru halfway point at the 6th hand but only took 13 points the rest of the way and ran the 9th hand winning with 69 points at the end of the 12th hand. **Steve Ybarra** was 2nd with 88 points.

<u>Game 2</u>: **Rich Lyon** was ahead the whole game and won in the 8th hand with 28 points. **Ray Bland** was 2nd with 44 points.

<u>Game 3</u>: **Ray Bland** "shot the moon" in hand 1. **Ray** ending up winning in the 10th hand with 44 points, and **Rich** was 2nd with 73 points.

<u>Game 4</u>: **Ray Bland** "shot the moon" in both hands 1 and 2. We do not recollect anyone every running two hands in a row. This made it a short game which ended after the 6th hand which was tied for shortest game of year. **Ray** only had 11 points which is extremely low. **Ron Polivka** was 2nd with 66 points.

<u>Game 5</u>: **Ray Bland** had to leave so this was a 3-handed game. **Rich Lyon** and **Steve Ybarra** were tied with 12 points at the halfway point thru the 5th hand. **Steve** and **Ron Polivka** were tied thru the 9th hand at 34 points when **Steve** shot the moon on the 12th and last hand. **Steve** won with 34 points, and **Ron** was 2nd with 60 points.

May 8th: We had two teams of 4 each play. Group 1:

<u>Game 1</u>: The game was a variation where the Jack of Diamonds is worth -10 points and we stop after reaching 75 points. **Bob West** was ahead thru the 11th hand, but **Ray Bland** pulled ahead in the next two hands and won with 26 points in the 13th hand. **Bob West** was 2nd with 46 points

<u>Game 2</u>: This was also the Jack of Diamonds variation stopping at 75 points. It was a close game between **Bob Finlayson** and **Ray Bland** thru the 5th hand. However, **Ray Bland** "Shot the Moon" in the 6th and final hand winning with -6 points, and **Bob Finlayson** was 2nd with 27 points. It's hard to tell how many times someone got the Jack of Diamonds, but to get -6 points **Ray** must have gotten the lion's share.

Game 3: The next 3 games were traditional hearts. **Bob** West had 0 points thru the first 5 hands, but **Bob Finlayson** pulled ahead when he ran the 6th hand, and no one could remember who passed to him. He won with 20 points in the 7th hand. **Bob West** was 2nd with 26 points. Game 4: This game was the longest we have ever had at 15 hands for traditional hearts. The game was close thru the 9th hand, but **Bob West** only added 10 points in the next 6 hands and won with 64 points in the 15th hand. **Ray Bland** was 2nd with 93 points. Ray "Shot the Moon" on the 12th hand.

<u>Game 5</u>: **Ray Bland** was ahead thru all 11 hands and won with 47 points. **Bob West** was 2nd with 56 points.

Group 2:

<u>Game 1</u>: **Ron Polivka** was ahead the entire game and won in the 11th hand with 37 points. **Frank Lucas** was 2nd with 47 points.

<u>Game 2</u>: **Frank Lucas** "shot the moon" in the 2nd hand, but **Rich Lyon** pulled ahead in the 7th hand and won in the 10th hand with 55 points. **Steve Ybarra** was 2nd with 61 points.

<u>Game 3</u>: **Frank Lucas** ran the 5^{th} hand and pulled ahead by the 6^{th} hand, winning in the 7^{th} hand with 38 points. **Steve Ybarra** was 2^{nd} with 41 points.

<u>Game 4</u>: The battle was between **Steve Ybarra** and **Frank Lucas** thru the 6th hand, when **Rick Lyon** slowed their march by "Shooting the moon". However, it was not enough as **Steve** only gained another 8 points in the next 4 hands and **Rich's** running stymied **Frank's** momentum. **Steve** won on the 11th hand with 49 points. **Ron Polivka** was 2nd with 92 points.

<u>Game 5</u>: **Rich Lyon** shot the moon in the first two hands, only the 2^{nd} time someone has run 2 hands in a row. **Rich** won in the 7^{th} hand with 49 points, and **Frank Lucas** was 2^{nd} with 63 points.

May 15th: We had two teams of 4 play.

<u>Group 1</u>: Players were **Rich Lyon, Frank Lucas, Ray Bland** and **Bob Finlayson**.

<u>Game 1</u>: **Frank Lucas** and **Ray Bland** were nip and tuck thru the 8th hand, but **Bob Finlayson** "shot the moon" in the 9th and last hand winning with 52 points. **Ray Bland** was 2nd with 65

<u>Game 2</u>: **Bob Finlayson** was ahead the whole game with only 16 points thru the 8^{th} hand. In the 9^{th} hand **Frank Lucas** "shot the moon" but to no avail, as **Bob** was so far ahead that he won with 46 points. **Rick Lyon** was 2^{nd} with 72 points.

Game 3: **Bob Finlayson** was ahead the whole game thru 12 hands, when **Frank Lucas** shot the moon in the 13th and last hand, but as in the prior game **Bob** was too far ahead and won with 72 points. **Frank** was 2nd with 92 points.

Group 2: Players were Steve Ybarra, Ron Polivka, George Sabbagha and Bob West

<u>Game 1</u>: **Bob West** was in the lead all the way and won in the 11^{th} hand with 49 points. **Steve Ybarra** was 2^{nd} with 64 points.

<u>Game 2</u>: **Ron Polivka** was ahead throughout and won in the 11th hand with 45 points. **Bob West** was 2nd with 56 points.

<u>Game 3</u>: **Steve Ybarra** and **Bob West** were often tied thru the 8 th hand, but **Bob West** edged out **Steve** by 3 points and won with 29 points. **Steve** was 2nd with 32 points.

<u>Game 4</u>: **Steve Ybarra** was ahead all the way and won with 11 points in the 7th hand, which ties for the lowest score this year. **Bob West** was 2nd with 26 points.

<u>Game 5</u>: **Steve Ybarra** was ahead all the way. **Bob West** tried to stop him by "Shooting the moon" in the 9th hand, but it was not enough. **Steve** won in the 11th hand with 52 points. **George Sabbagha** was 2nd with 92 points.

<u>Game 6:</u> **Ron Polivka** was ahead thru the 11th hand and was tied with **Bob West** in the 12th hand. **Bob West** won with 71 points in the 13th hand. **Ron Polivka** was 2nd with 82 points.

May 22nd

Group 1: Players were Frank Lucas, Steve Ybarra, Ray Bland and Bob West.

Game 1: Not much of a contest here, Ray Bland was ahead the whole way and won with only 15 points in the 9th hand. Bob West was 2nd with 44 points.

Game 2: Ray Bland was ahead through the 5th hand but ran into some turbulence. Bob West ended up winning with 40 points, and Ray was 2nd with 60.

Game 3: Bob West was ahead thru the 10th hand but after the 11th he and Frank Lucas were basically tied. Bob was only able to head off Frank by running the 13th and last hand when he laid down his remaining 9 cards for the win at 72 points. He had a lot of hearts. Frank was 2nd with 97 points.

<u>Game 4</u>: **Frank Lucas** played another good game. He was easily ahead thru the 8^{th} hand, but **Ray Bland** ran the last hand and won in the 9^{th} hand with 48 points. **Frank** was 2^{nd} with 58 points.

<u>Game 5</u>: **Frank Lucas** again started out strong "shooting the moon" in the 1st hand. However, S**teve Ybarra** and **Ray Bland** held steady thru the 7th hand and were nearly tied. But **Steve** was able to win in the 9th hand with 50 points. **Ray** was 2nd with 62 points.

<u>Group 2</u>: Players were **George Sabbagha, Bob Finlayson, Rich Lyon** and **Ron Polivka**.

<u>Game 1</u>: **George Sabbagha** was ahead the whole game and only had 3 points thru the 5^{th} hand. **Rich Lyon** then ran the 6^{th} hand, but it did not change the result. **George** won in the 11^{th} hand with 56 points. **Ron Polivka** was 2^{nd} with 70 points.

<u>Game 2</u>: The game lasted 15 hands which is tied for the longest ever, but even more interesting is it created our first ever tie for 1st, and a very evenly matched game. 



Below are random comments submitted by branch members of what they have observed or been doing during this unprecedented time of sheltering in place.

I know we have a number of veterans in our branch and I thought this might be of interest to them as well as the rest of our membership. The Congressional Gold Medal was awarded collectively to the Merchant Mariners of World War II and was enacted and signed into law

on March 13th, 2020. This medal is one of the highest honors in the United States.

Until 1986, the Merchant Mariners serving during World War II were not recognized for their participation and sacrifice during World War II despite suffering the highest attrition rate of any of the Armed Services.

Because of the Covid-19 pandemic, the ceremony normally scheduled in June has been postponed with a date to be rescheduled. Dave Yoho, a former Merchant Mariner, will be accepting the award on behalf of the Merchant Mariners after which it will be given to The American Merchant Marine Museum. After listening to Dave's speech, and hearing the passion of someone who lived through that period, I felt others who shared that experience, will appreciate hearing what he has to say on behalf of his comrades.

Bill Holly Medicine & Health COVID-19 study looks at genetics of healthy people who develop severe illness Researchers seek answers to virus's mysteries, clues to possible treatments By Julia Evangelou Strait

To help unravel the mysteries of COVID-19, scientists are sequencing the DNA of young, healthy adults and children who develop severe illness despite having no underlying medical problems. The researchers are looking for genetic defects that could put certain individuals at high risk of becoming severely ill from the novel coronavirus.

The McDonnell Genome Institute at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis is one of more than 30 genome sequencing hubs worldwide participating in the study. Rheumatologist Megan A. Cooper, MD, PhD, an associate professor of pediatrics, is leading the research at Washington University. Called the COVID Human Genetic Effort, the international project is co-led by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and Rockefeller University.

The researchers allso plan to study people who never become infected with SARS-CoV 2, the virus that causes COVID-19 despite repeated exposures. Such individuals may have genetic variations that protect against infection. For example, certain rare genetic variants are known to thwart some types of viral infections, including H:IV and norovirus. Knowledge gained from understanding COVID-19's extremes - unusual susceptibility and resistance - could lead to new therapeutic strategies for the illness.

"The first focus of our study will be patients with severe responses to SARS-CoV-2 infection - severe enough to require intensive care - who appear otherwise healthy and are younger than 50," said Cooper, who also leads the clinical immunology program and the Jeffrey Modell Diagnostic and Research Center for Primary Immunodeficiencies at St. Louis Children's Hos ital.

"These patients don't have uncontrolled diabetes, heart disease, chronic lung disease or any other condition that we know increases the risk of severe complications from COVID-19," she said. "For example, we sometimes see stories about, say, a marathon runner or a generally (Continued on next page)

fit, healthy person who nevertheless got very sick from this virus, or the few healthy children who are getting very sick with COVID-19. These are the kinds of patients we're interested in for this study. A small proportion of hospitalized patients will fit this category, likely less than 10%.

Cooper studies primary immunodeficiencies in children. Primary immunodeficiencies are a group of more than 450 genetic disorders of the immune system. They often are caused by mutations in single genes that affect different aspects of immunity.

"With this pandemic, we can use our skills in gene hunting to search for genes that might be associated with severe COVID-19 in children and younger adults," she said. "We can foresee a future ability to do a genetic sequencing test for individual patients hospitalized with SARS-CoV-2 and get an idea of whether they are likely to need more intensive ca re. In the meantime, we will be able to learn a great deal about how the immune system responds to this virus and what it needs to be able to respond effectively and in an appropriate manner."

These patients' genetics could reveal the important immune pathways that the body needs to fight the virus. That knowledge could lead to therapies that also could help other patients who don't have a genetic susceptibility to the virus but perhaps have high-risk conditions, such as diabetes or heart disease.

"Our immune systems have never seen this virus before," Cooper said. "We're seeing severe COVID-19 complications play out across the world right now. It is going to take a global effort to investigate the genetic factors and the immune system factors that really control this infection."

Research related to COVID-19, including co lecting and distributing of patient samples, is managed through Washington University's Institute of Clinical and Translational Sciences (ICTS), led by William G. Powder! MD, who is also the Larry J. Shapiro Director of the Institute for Public Health, the J. William Campbell Professor of Medicine and co-director of the Division of Infectious Diseases.

This research is supported by funding from the St. Louis Children's Hospital Foundation and the Jeffrey Modell Foundation.


