What is Changing

Starting this month, our Branch will no longer require attendance at our monthly luncheons. (including Annual Luncheon Payers) wishing to attend a luncheon will need to make a reservation (i.e., opt-in) by Noon on the Friday before the luncheon. (For example, this month the deadline is Noon on Friday, March 3.) Members who attend, without a prior reservation will not be guaranteed a meal. Members (including Annual Luncheon Payers) who make a reservation and then find they cannot attend must cancel their reservation by noon on the Friday before the luncheon. Members cancelling after the deadline will be asked to reimburse the Branch for their meal. This reservationbased approach will provide us with a more accurate headcount and prevent the Branch from paying for unused meals.

For our February Valentine's Day luncheon we had an excellent presentation on the heart by Dr. Murali Dharan, a cardio-thoracic surgeon. He discussed heart bypass surgery, heart

valve function and replacement and the placement of stents in arteries to reduce the effects of blockages.



The presentation included some forty slides and a short video. His presentation itself was very enlightening and entertaining as well. I never knew that my healthy aortic valve looked like a Mercedes insignia but when it was under duress it looked more

like a Chevy insignia! We thank our own Larry Kaye who underwent cardiac surgery last fall with Dr. Dharan for recruiting him while he was in recovery after his own heart surgery. Dedication!! Slides from the presentation have been posted on the SIR 146 website.

Our speaker for March will be Ms. Deddie Le Vine, Director of Infrastructure and Contracts for the California Independent System Operator or CAL ISO. This organization was established in 1998, driven by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to manage the transmission system serving electricity to some 90% of California and part of Western of Nevada. Their goal is to match the power demands of the region with suppliers at the lowest cost. For our region, base load is met with green energy including solar, wind, geothermal and nuclear. When demand exceeds this base load other sources are brought online beginning with the lowest bid cost for power for that day. Our speaker will describe this state-wide regional process and provide insight on the plans to develop local sub-regional networks of power producers to meet demands in the future in our state.



confirm your attendance and to reserve your meal! And, remember, RSVP, stands for "respond please"... so if you aren't coming let us know that too!

A quick comment on submitting items for SIR-Call. Our preferred mode for your submissions is in a Microsoft Word file. A second choice would be a plain text file. Lastly, is just embedded in an e-mail. When using Word it is best if you select and use the SIR font, Lato and set the font size to 11. This is the default for SIR-Call and you will get a file that will give you a rough idea of the amount of space your final version will take up when entered into SIR-Call. Please do not send us PDF files... generally speaking, these can not be edited,. For those of you who might be interested, we use Microsoft Publisher to format the final product you are reading. Although not widely publicized, it is part of the Microsoft Office suite of programs; if you have Office installed you most likely have access to it. For table-like material, we can also accept Microsoft Excel files... although they usually need to be converted to Word documents prior to putting them into SIR-Call.

As far as pictures, we can accept almost any picture format but you (and we) will get better results if you send your pictures as attached files. Embeding pictures in a Word document works but generally results in a lower quality image because we nearly always edit (crop) the pictures to emphasize the subject and conserve space in SIR-Call.

The deadline for submissions for the April issue is **March 24th.** Don't forget, we encourage member contributions to SIR-Call so, if you have something you would like to say, send it in to br146SirCall@gmail.com, putting "Member Note" in the subject line, and we will try to get it out in the next available issue.

A site on the National Register of Historic Places, the Shadelands Ranch Museum is a time capsule of turn-of -the-20th-Century Walnut Creek. Completed in 1903, the Museum was originally the ranch home of <u>Hiram Penniman</u>, an early Walnut Creek pioneer who came to Walnut Creek in 1850 and eventually owned some 500 acres of fruit and nut orchards in the Ygnacio Valley. Penniman and his second wife, Carrie Morris, raised four children, two sons and two daughters. Penniman built the large redwood-framed Colonial Revival house on the ranch to provide for the future security of his unmarried daughter, Mary. The house is furnished with many original family furnishings and treatments. The Shadelands Ranch Historical Museum is operated by the Walnut Creek Historical Society. The building also serves as the Society's headquarters. **Send a check to Jim Pope**, **385 Bryan Drive**, **Alamo**, **CA 94507 for \$7.50 per person made out to SIR 146 Branch**. **Maximum 30 people**.

AREA 16 Fishing Report

While we finally got started on our winter trout fishing, the rain and wind not only muddied some of our favorite reservoirs but made it impossible for Fish

and Game to meet their fish planting schedules. Close by reservoirs such as Lafayette did not get planted due to flooding. Los Vagueros Reservoir closed until further notice due to completely impassable roadways and flooding. On a brighter note, because of the limited ability of Fish and Game to make the above-mentioned scheduled fish plantings, excess plantings have been made in Contra Loma Reservoir leading to excellent fishing for many SIR fishing club members. Mike Browne of #146, caught a nice six-pound trout leading the way. He also caught a leopard shark fishing from a pier in the bay. Striper Fishing in the Delta has been productive at times. On one trip to Pittsburg, club members 25-30 stripers caught with six keepers. Sturgeon fishing has been very slow with only one to two legal fish being caught on guided trips. The first signs of halibut have been reported in the South Bay near Oyster Point. Halibut fishing should pick up, weather permitting in March.

SIR members and guests are welcome, and indeed encouraged, to participate in fishing trips as well as attend the monthly meetings. 

The SIR Branch 146 Book Group met Monday, February 20th, and discussed our book of the month, The Passenger, by Cormac McCarthy, a long-time and well known writer, with a

very large following.

The setting for the book is primarily the New Orleans area, but it ventures off into other areas in the country, i.e., Knoxville, Tucson, Idaho, and Chicago. The main characters are Bobby Western and his sister Alicia, both brilliant and quite quirky, especially Alicia, who is much younger than Bobby. The sister is his major true love interest, but he never tells her of the depth of his feelings for her.

This book is the first of two, so the story, which is minimal, is not complete, and the reader never learns the outcome. The title "character" does not have any identifying attributes that just might let you know who he or she is, except that it was a person who disappeared from a private plane that was found intact underwater near New Orleans, with all of the other passengers deceased. The pieces and parts of the plane that might lead you to know more about the "passenger" have also been removed.

Bobby Western's sister, Alicia, a very brilliant mathematician, started at the University of Chicago at the age of 13. She learned nearly everything there was to know about violins and made mathematical models of acoustics, culminating with a model that told you how to make the perfect violin. She used her inheritance to buy a very expensive violin.

She spends her time contemplating the meaning of life, suicide, and many other esoteric ideas. She also has a friend, Kid, who visits with her quite often in certain parts of the book. He was a thalidomide baby, with flippers rather than arms and hands, but does manage very well. He is quite intelligent and speaks well.

As part of the "Feds" push to get Bobby to answer questions, they "turn off" his passport, but not all agencies know this yet. Bobby has made friends with Kline, who advises him on how to live his life within these "constrictions," and after a while Bobby is able to use his now invalid passport to leave the country and move to northeastern Spain, where he will spend the rest of his days, living in an old windmill on the coast. 





Have A Slice of Pi

Are you in need of something to celebrate? Of Course you are. At our ages every day should be a celebration so here is a special day, just for you... March 14 is recognized in several countries around the world as **Pi Day [or to many of us, Pie Day]**. It's a celebration of that most famous transcendental number, π (pronounced pie), in which 3.14 are the first digits.

In the United States, the designation of Pi Day started in 2009. Ten years later, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) proclaimed March 14 as the International Day of Mathematics.

Pi is the ratio of a circle's circumference to the diameter. Ancient civilizations like the Egyptians and Babylonians not only knew about the existence of pi, but also found its approximate value. We're talking about 2000 B.C. here!

Standing on the shoulders of those civilizations, Archimedes created an algorithm to approximate π in 250 B.C. The earliest known use of the Greek letter π to represent the ratio is by Welsh mathematician William Jones in 1706, possibly as shorthand for the word, periphery.

Regardless... Pie [Pi] Day now offers us yet another reason to celebrate. And it's easy.

It can be pizza pie, shephard's pie, cherry pie, chicken pie, apple pie. Whatever you chose. Just be sure to have some on this special day.
