Our speaker for the April luncheon was Dr. Jon Haveman who is the Executive Director of a group of economists whose goal is to help demystify the soft science of economics. The or-

ganization is called the National Economics Education Delegation or NEED and is available to talk to groups, including young adults, who are interested in having a better understanding of economics and how it interacts with our lives. His presentation focused on our current economic condition and whether or not we are due for a recession and if so will it be a soft landing or more of a crash landing. He explained that the recent banking crisis with Silicon Valley Bank has added to the chances of a recession but the actions of the Treasury Department were swift and thorough and should limit the impact of that challenge to the economy. He did opine that if Congress does not raise the debt ceiling in a timely fashion we will have a major financial crisis, shaking world confidence in the stability of the USA. As a self-proclaimed optimist he feels that reason will prevail and the soft landing is still likely.

For our Ladies Day Luncheon we will be serenaded by twelve to fifteen banjo players including our very own **Bud Pearce**. In June our speaker from The John Muir Group will enlighten us about the Future of Health Care and in July we will hear from Charles Fracchia of ABC News about scams that target seniors.

The group rate for "In the Heights" is \$41.00 per person for reserved seating for SIR members and guests. Deadline to reserve is Wednesday, May 17.



A railroad museum where the exhibits come to life!

The Pacific Locomotive Association, Inc. operates Niles Canyon Railway as a living history museum interpreting the importance of our heritage railroads in the development of California and the nation. The purpose of the organization is to preserve the physical aspects and atmosphere of Pacific Coast railroading during the period from 1910 to 1960. Our mission is to develop and operate a working railroad museum for the benefit of the general public. Operating historic railroad equipment using standard railroad practices for train crews, signaling, block operations, and equipment maintenance.

- Preserving the atmosphere of railroads in small-town America before the 1960s by connecting the historic communities of Sunol, the Niles District of Fremont, and eventually Pleasanton.
- Providing educational programs for schools, civic organizations, and community events.
- Instructing the public in railroad history, tradition, and the evolution of rail transportation technology.

The Pacific Locomotive Association also has railroad artifacts on display and interpretive educational exhibits at the Sunol Depot.

Shadelands Ranch OverflowTour

Our overflow tour group of 15 met at the National Register of Historic Places, the Shadelands Ranch Museum to tour the turn-of-the-20th-Century home. Completed in 1903, the Museum was originally the ranch home of Hiram Penniman, an early Walnut Creek pioneer who came to Walnut Creek in 1850 and eventually owned some 500 acres of fruit and nut orchards in the Ygnacio Valley. The house is furnished with many original family furnishings and treatments. The Shadelands Ranch Historical Museum is operated by the Walnut Creek Historical Society. The 2 docents conducted an outstanding tour explaining the Ranch's history and Hiram's role in the forming the town of Walnut Creek. They also described the many furnishings, dish and glassware, the old wood stove kitchen, and the many pictures of historic value. All enjoyed the outing and then moved on to The Greenery Restaurant for a lovely lunch gazing up at Mount Diablo. 





The Branch 146 Book Group met on March 30 and reviewed our current book, Horse, by Geraldine Brooks. This book has been a best seller and our group heartedly endorses it for a

The horse, whose original name is Darley, is born on a horse farm near Lexington in northern Kentucky that is owned by a local physician of some stature. The primaknows how to get the most out of a horse without abusing him or her. The owner is a kind man who gives the trainer free rein to run that part of the farm. The owner provides a house for his family to live in and the trainer is a free man because the owner paid him well enough so that he could buy his way out of slavery. Although the father is free, the family remains enslaved. The family includes a son, Jarrett, who learns how to be a great trainer and the bulk of this part of the story is about him and Darley.

with horses at a very early age. His father "delegates" the responsibility of being with the mother of Darley on the night that Darley is born, and so Jarrett establishes an early relationship with him. The owner of the farm gives the horse to Jarrett's father as payment for past services and Jarrett's father lets him take the lead as Darley's trainer. prepped and displayed at the Smithsonian. Jess and Theo meet when she accuses him of stealing her bicycle. In fact, Theo was riding his own bicycle, which was similar to the one owned by Jess. Jess is humiliated because she realizes that she thought that Theo was a thief because he was black and she apologizes to Theo. Things smooth over and they eventually become lovers.

Theo and Jess work together to make sure that Lexington's skeleton is fully restored. Theo also realizes that the drawing that he purchased from the widow for a pittance was a drawing of Lexington by Thomas Scott and is worth much more than he paid for it. To Jess' surprise, he returns the drawing to the widow, notwithstanding the widow's disdain for him.

One evening, just before dinner at Jess' home, Theo and his dog Clancy go for a run in nearby Rock Creek Park.. Theo comes across a woman lying unconscious on rocks in a ravine partially filled with water. There is no cell service. Theo clambers down to the woman. who was still alive, and begins to pick her up in order to carry her to the trail above. At that moment, the police arrive and a rookie cop mistakes Theo for a criminal and shoots and kills him. The policeman is exonerated and this leads a Washington Post reporter who previously had written stories about police and black killings to write about Theo's death. Theo was in grad school at Georgetown, and had a student following that uses the incident to protest the violence and racism in the city that derives from the "rising tide of White House-sanctioned white supremacy" and the "racist society" that envelops Washington. Although the book is effective in describing both the actual racism and the subtle racism that people of color endure, the description of Washington and the White House is a bit over the top. Notwithstanding this, we recommend the book.

Couples Dining Out Bruce Borgman

Your Dining Out hosts were hard pressed this time to come up with a dining event that would match our last one in March at the Sichuan House. We had a record number of din-

ers, 72, attend this event. We were also challenged to try to find a restaurant which would not break the bank. Since we had a family style dinner at the Sichuan House, the cost per person was considerably less than at the traditional plated dinner. Also, since we generally have 60 or more diners, it is difficult to find a restaurant which can accommodate a large group.

We thought we would go back the conventional service and scour the area for an appropriate restaurant. We thought we would go for an Italian restaurant in May, and, true to our goal, we decided to go to La Finestra Ristorante in Moraga. Veterans of this activity will recall that we went to this restaurant many years ago when it was in Lafayette. Looking at our Dining Out archives, we actually paid less than \$40 when we were here in 2014. Many of you will recall that shortly after we were there, the restaurant suffered a major fire. In talking with Jeff, the chef/owner, he relates that sadly, hardly anything could be saved from this devastating event. It took some time, but Jeff opened a new restaurant, also named La Finestra, in Moraga. We had considered dining there before this

but thought that it was a bit further than our diners prefer. We checked it out this last week, though and thought that the drive along Moraga Boulevard was a pleasant one and we enjoyed a nice chat with Jeff as we reviewed a menu and cost that would be agreeable.

The cost of the entrees is much more reasonable than at most restaurants, but adding in tax and gratuity brings the total cost to \$59 per person. On the plus side, you will be pleased with the menu which will include a salad, a choice of four entrees, dessert, and coffee and tea. 



Since this "holiday" is fast approaching, I leave you with a short history of Cinco de Mayo...

Confusion With Mexican Independence Day

Many people outside Mexico mistakenly believe that Cinco de Mayo is a celebration of Mexican independence but...

Independence Day in Mexico (Día de la Independencia) is commemorated on September 16, the anniversary of the revolutionary priest Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla's famous "Grito de Dolores" a call to arms that amounted to a declaration of war against the Spanish colonial government in 1810.

Cinco de Mayo, or the fifth of May, is a holiday that celebrates Mexico's victory over France at the Battle of Puebla in 1862. At the time, Mexico was in financial ruin after years of internal strife, and the new president was forced to default on debt payments to European governments. In response, France, Britain and Spain sent naval forces to Veracruz, Mexico, demanding repayment. Britain and Spain negotiated with Mexico and withdrew their forces.

France, however, ruled by Napoleon III, decided to use the opportunity to carve an empire out of Mexican territory. Late in 1861, a well-armed French fleet stormed Veracruz, landing a large force of troops and driving President Juárez and his government into retreat.

The Battle of Puebla

Certain that success would come swiftly, 6,000 French troops under General Charles Latrille de Lorencez set out to attack Puebla de Los Angeles, a small town in east-central Mexico. From his new headquarters in the north, Juárez rounded up a ragtag force of 2,000 loyal men—many of them either Indigenous Mexicans or of mixed ancestry—and sent them to Puebla.

The vastly outnumbered and poorly supplied Mexicans, led by Texas-born General Ignacio Zaragoza, fortified the town and prepared for the French assault. On May 5, 1862, Lorencez gathered his army—supported by heavy artillery—before the city of Puebla and led an assault.

How Long Did the Battle of Puebla Last?

The battle lasted from daybreak to early evening, and when the French finally retreated they had lost nearly 500 soldiers. Fewer than 100 Mexicans had been killed in the clash.

Although not a major strategic win in the overall war against the French, it bolstered the resistance movement. In 1867—thanks in part to military support and political pressure from the United States, which was finally in a position to aid its besieged neighbor after the end of the Civil War—France finally withdrew.

The same year, Austrian Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian, who had been installed as emperor of Mexico in 1864 by Napoleon, was captured and executed by Juárez's forces. Puebla de Los Angeles was renamed for General Zaragoza, who died of typhoid fever months after his historic triumph there.

Cinco de Mayo in Mexico

Within Mexico, Cinco de Mayo is primarily observed in the state of Puebla, where Zaragoza's unlikely victory occurred, although other parts of the country also take part in the celebration. For many Mexicans, however, May 5 is a day like any other: It is not a federal holiday, so offices, banks and stores remain open.

Why Do We Celebrate Cinco de Mayo in the United States?

There can be confusion over the origins of Cinco de Mayo. Some think it's a holiday celebrating Mexican independence from Spain or that it was dreamed up to sell more beer and guacamole.

In the United States, Cinco de Mayo is widely interpreted as a celebration of Mexican culture and heritage, particularly in areas with substantial Mexican-American populations. Chicano activists raised awareness of the holiday in the 1960s, in part because they identified with the victory of Indigenous Mexicans (such as Juárez) over European invaders during the Battle of Puebla.

Today, revelers mark the occasion with parades, parties, mariachi music, Mexican folk dancing and traditional foods such as tacos and mole poblano.
