AREA 16 Fishing Report

Paul Dubow

The speaker at our September meeting was Evan Sawyer, a naturalist at the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) in Sacramento.

He spoke at length about the status of the Delta and how the NOAA tracks electronically tagged fish that live in the Delta.

Paul Dubow made a nostalgic trip back to Wisconsin, where he lived prior to moving to the East Bay in 1970. Between 1967 and 2017, Paul and a group of his former Milwaukee neighbors made an annual trip to a lake in northern Wisconsin to fish for walleye, bass, and muskies and-of course---to drink beer. The annual trek ended after the last member retired, but the surviving members decided to have a last reunion this year. There were no muskies and very little beer drinking, but there were lots of walleyes and bass. Paul personally caught and released 23 fish and one of his companions landed a 22-inch largemouth bass.

As we have reported in previous columns, rockfishing is once again limited to areas more than 300 feet deep. And so, Carl Moyer, Bob Lively, Bob Stein, and Alan Yan sailed out on the Sea Wolf to the Farallones, where the ocean is more than 300 feet deep, and the rockfish are much larger. They were rewarded with a bevy of large rockfish and ling cod. The highlight of the trip occurred when a blue shark grabbed a rockfish doubleheader that Carl was reeling in. Adding the shark to the weight of the line caused the line to break. But Carl prevailed as the deckhand was able to gaff one of the rockfish before the shark swallowed it.



The rockfish limitation, combined with the ban on salmon fishing, led **Carl Moyer** to try a new venue. He fished for sand dabs. They are a lot smaller than salmon and the large rockfish, but they taste pretty good!

Tom Kostik departed from his twice weekly trips to the Delta and traveled to Pinecrest Lake in the Sierras, where he caught and released over fifteen rainbow trout and forty black bass.

Fishing in San Pablo Reservoir is coming to an end soon, as the lake closes for its annual winter hiatus. However, Carl Moyer and Bob Lively dropped by for what might be their last trip of the year to the lake and caught some nice catfish.

After the September meeting ended, the fishmasters stayed on to plan the 2024 calendar. We are going to have a full schedule. This includes regular trips to the Delta for bass and stripers; San Francisco Bay for halibut, leopard sharks, and stripers; San Pablo Reservoir for trout and catfish, the Farallones for rockfish; Lake Almanor for trout; New Melones Reservoir and Stampede Reservoir for kokanee; various lakes in the Sierras for trout and kokanee; and the annual five-day foray for big fish out of San Diego. And if the salmon season reopens, there will be lots of charter trips in the ocean.

Our next meeting will be on November 30 at the Legends Bar and Grill, at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway, in Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30 am but come earlier for breakfast (beginning at 7 am) for camaraderie and fish stories. All SIR members are welcome, even if one has never fished before or has not fished for a long time and all SIR members are invited on our outings. If you have no equipment, we will lend you ours. Book Group John Pearl

The SIR Branch 146 Book Group met in late September and reviewed our book of the month. Midnight's Furies, The Deadly Legacy

of India's Partition by Nisid Hajari:

most consequential and tragic events in modern history. The book chronicles the partition of India and the provide much information about Britain's treatment of riots and other violence that followed, which resulted the subcontinent's citizens prior to the partition. in the deaths of millions of people and the displacement of millions more.

The two main characters are Jawaharlal Nehru, the first cy. It is a powerful and moving book that will stay with prime minister of India, and Mohammad Ali Jinnah, the you long after you finish reading it. founder of Pakistan. The two men had much in common, both being proud, rigid men who were thin skinned. Neither was religious. Jinnah, a Muslim, drank alcohol and ate pork. He went to mosques to give speeches, not pray,. Nehru, a Hindu, was openly secular and was given to blame religious zealotry for many of India's problems. But, notwithstanding their secularism, they were both skilled at exploiting the fears and prejudices of their more devout followers, and they disliked each other intensely. Neither was a true statesman.

The tense relationship between Nehru and Jinnah has spilled over to the tense relationship that exists today between their two countries. That relationship was not helped by the nature of the border between them, which was drawn by Cyril Radcliffe, a British lawyer with no prior experience in India or Pakistan. He was given just five weeks to draw a border that would divide a subcontinent of over 400 million people, and it was a disaster. It divided provinces, villages, and even families. It led to widespread violence and bloodshed. and the two countries still dispute the fate of Kashmir, now divided by the "Line of Control," with the armies of the two countries controlling this "temporary" border to avoid further bloodshed.

Nehru was a flawed leader, but he was also a visionary. He laid the foundation for India's democracy and its economic development.

Mohammad Ali Jinnah was a brilliant barrister and a shrewd politician. He was the driving force behind the creation of Pakistan. Jinnah was a complex and controversial figure. He was a staunch secularist who believed in religious freedom, but he also used religious

rhetoric to mobilize support for Pakistan.


Hajari's writing is vivid and engaging. He brings the events of partition to life with a cinematic flair. He also does an excellent job of explaining the complex political and social forces that led to the partition. Perhaps our only criticism is that he gives the British somewhat of a pass. Archibald Wavell and Louis Mountbatten, who served as the British governor generals during the ne-Midnight's Furies is a masterful account of one of the gotiations leading up to partition, did give sensible advice to the two protagonists, but the author does not
