In August we had six members who had made a reservation for lunch and were then unable to make it, thus resulting in a loss of \$216 for the Branch. Of the six, only three promised to re-

imburse the Branch. So far this year we have experienced a net loss of about \$1,128 from unrecovered, unbudgeted luncheon expenses. That represents about 15% of our total annual budget. That net loss is almost \$5 per member and may push us to raise our dues to keep the Branch solvent. We want to encourage members to join us for the monthly lunch but when you do make a reservation, please notify the luncheon chairman as soon as you learn that you will NOT be able to make it. I recognize there are situations that develop that make it difficult to make the lunch, but if you can notify the luncheon chairman as soon as you know or by noon the Monday of the week of the lunch that you can't make it, we can at least try to adjust the count that was given to Boundary Oaks. If you miss the lunch and do not have a valid excuse, you are responsible for the cost of the meal.

Our speaker this month was Mr. Nick Brokaw who provided some great insights on how the legislative process works in Sacramento. The combined senate (40 members) and representative branch (80 members) produce on average 2000 bills per session. The idea that eventually becomes a bill might be initiated by the public, the legislator, a lobbyist or legislative staff and the draft undergoes reviews by various sub-committees as it works its way through the two branches.

Our next speaker is Mark Triska representing the Livermore Valley Wine Growers. He will tell us about the 120+ years of wine making history in the Valley and enlighten us regarding the tasting, tours and dining/wine pairing opportunities that might be available in the near-term.
























































Our little covey of birdchasers met again last Wednesday the 13th, at the Clayton community Library and headed North from there. Having been in isolation for a

few months because of the heat and vacations, it was great to be "On the road again".

We spotted all the usual suspects: Western Tanagers, Anna's Hummers, Acorn Woodpeckers, Nuttail's Woodpeckers, Black Phoebes, House Finches, Lesser Goldfinches, and even some Turkey Vultures. AREA 16 Fishing Report Paul Dubow

Fall is now upon us. Usually, the onset of autumn is just a calendar date because it does not affect most of our fishing ven-

ues. However, this year salmon fishing was barred and that is usually a significant activity in the fall. In addition, as of September 1, the Department of Fish and Wildlife re-imposed its rule that sport fishermen cannot angle for rockfish in depths less than 300 feet. That rule had been suspended as of July 15. Thus, rock fishing is limited for the balance of the year. Nevertheless, our intrepid group had some very nice outings recently.

off Montara on the Sundance. Ross Abbott was on one of the trips and Lee Clark was on the other. The group limited out on both occasions. We also had a guest onboard and he pulled in a 33 lb. California halibut. That is the largest California halibut we have seen since we began fishing for them several years ago.

Carl Moyer caught a limit of rockfish on board the Sea Wolf. He also caught lingcod and rockfish from his boat off Pacifica. Bob Lively accompanied him on one outing and caught his first lingcod. Carl and Ken Bellindir caught Pacific halibut on another trip on Carl's boat, but the star of that trip was a 60 lb. bat ray that **Ken** landed.

Stan Wong captained a veterans' trip in the Delta, appropriately on Veterans Day, and they landed fifteen keeper stripers. Three were caught before Stan could put his own rod in the water. The largest was 10 lbs.

Nick Jacuba tried out his new boat in Mexican waters and off Santa Catalina Island. He landed some tuna and sand dabs in Mexico. In California, there were no

tuna but Nick and friends caught some calico bass and sand dabs.

Tom Kostik, our Delta expert, made four trips to his favorite venue, and did very well. He caught 284 stripers, of which 28 were keepers (which he released, as is his custom). He also caught eleven bluegills, two crappie, and two Sacramento pike (formerly known as squawfish). We can vouch for the accuracy of **Tom's** numbers because he takes a counter with him. He also uses the counter for his golf game. But **Tom** says that he never reaches 284 while playing golf.

Dave Rege caught some stripers in the Delta and some trout in Lake Tahoe. He also successfully fished for red crab in Anacortes, Washington.

Pete Gates, Steve Lofton, and Lee Clark and two of their friends journeyed to a lodge near Petersburg, Alaska, and limited out on salmon and halibut.

Paul Dubow led two groups which fished for rockfish All Branch 146 members are welcome to join our fishing outings, even if you have never fished before. During the next few months, we will be fishing for rockfish and lingcod in the ocean, black bass and stripers in the Delta, and trout and catfish at San Pablo Reservoir and other local venues. Later in the fall, we will have an overnight outing fishing for kokanee in New Melones Reservoir. You are also invited to attend our monthly meetings. Our next two meetings are on Thursday September 28th and Thursday October 26, at the Legends Bar and Grill at the Diablo Creek golf course at 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30 am, but many of us gather at 7 am or thereafter for breakfast and/or fishing stories and so please join us at that time. 

The SIR 146 Book Group met Monday, August 28th. Our "Book of the Month" was *The March* by E.L. Doctorow. He is a well-

known author, who has written several books, Ragtime being one of his best.

E.L. Doctorow's *The March* is a fictionalized account of General William Tecumseh Sherman's "March to the Sea" during the Civil War. The novel follows a cast of characters, both real and fictional, as they journey through the ravaged South, witnessing firsthand the brutality of war and the resilience of the human spirit.

The central characters include:

<u>General Sherman</u>: A brilliant but complex commander, Sherman is determined to crush the South and end the war quickly.

<u>Colonel Sartorius</u>: A Union surgeon who is haunted by the horrors he has seen.

<u>Emily Thompson</u>: A dispossessed Southern woman who is forced to join the march.

"Whenever, I teach clinical medicine to students in the fourth year of medicine, I ask the following question: "What are the causes of mental confusion in the elderly?"

Some answer: "Tumors in the head". I answer: No!

Others suggest: "Early symptoms of Alzheimer's". answer again: No!

With each rejection of their answers, their responses dry up.

And they are even more open-mouthed, when I list the most common cause: "dehydration."

It may sound like a joke; but it isn't.

People over 60 generally stop feeling thirsty and consequently, stop drinking fluids. When no one is around to remind them to drink fluids, they quickly dehydrate. Dehydration is severe and affects the entire body. It may cause abrupt mental confusion, a drop in blood pressure, increased heart palpitations, angina (chest pain), coma and even death

This habit of forgetting to drink fluids, begins at age 60, when we have just over 50% of the water we should have in our bodies. People over 60 have a lower water reserve. This is part of the natural aging process.

But there are more complications. Although they are dehydrated, they don't feel like drinking water, because their internal balance mechanisms don't work very well.

Conclusion:

People over 60 years old dehydrate easily, not only because they have a smaller water supply; but also because they do not feel the lack of water in the body. Although people over 60 may look healthy, the performance of reactions and chemical functions can damage their entire body.

So here are two alerts:

- 1) Get into the habit of drinking liquids. Liquids include water, juices, teas, coconut water, soups, and water-rich fruits, such as watermelon, melon, peaches and pineapple; Orange and tangerine also work. The important thing is that, every two hours, you must drink some liquid. Remember this!
- 2) Alert for family members: constantly offer fluids to people over 60. At the same time, observe them.

If you realize that they are rejecting liquids and, from one day to the next, they are irritable, breathless or display a lack of attention, these are almost certainly recurrent symptoms of dehydration.

Inspired to drink more water now?
