Big Sir's Corner

We continue to grow our membership with 3 new members added this July bringing our total for the year to 29 new members. The average age of these new members is 65+, which is close to the average of all

our recent additions. We now have a couple of "kids" who are in their 50s!! I am not sure I can remember back to when I was in my 50s! I think we need to make sure that we have the right set of activities in place to attract and keep our younger members. Some may even be only in partial retirement, so we may need to look at activities like golf, bocce, cycling, hiking, etc. to make sure we have activities that meet their timing constraints like evenings and weekends.

Which brings me to the results of a recent STATE SIR ZOOM meeting that was focused on the Way Forward for SIR. As I mentioned before, statewide, our membership is way down and this presents problems for the organization. Our overhead costs are mostly fixed tied to insurance, annual business license costs, and state taxes. We have something like 100 or so Branches and 8400 members so the average branch has about 84 members. Our branch is among the five largest with 269 members and our membership is increasing. Only about 1/3 of the branches are increasing, 1/3 are static and 1/3 are decreasing. If our current downtrend in membership continues at its current pace the state estimates that we will be out of business in 5 to 10 years. Given the physical. health and emotional benefits of an active lifestyle, that would be a disaster for men as they transition from an active business-oriented lifestyle to one with too much free-time. This problem is not limited to SIRs: the Elks, VA organizations, Kiwani, churches are all are experiencing the aging issue of members and lack of interest from potential new members. The State SIR team is looking at a Way Forward to mitigate these

problems and to rejuvenate the organization and is looking for insight from the branches to make that happen. Here are some of the ideas they are considering and **my** understanding of their their reasoning (or my insight).

- Change the name of SIRs. Outsiders are not sure what SIR means (are we British aristocracy?) and it is too restrictive (men only?) State is proposing a contest for a new name with a \$500 prize
- Our Rooster is outdated-we need a new logo. State is also looking to invest \$500 in prize money to the winner of a new logo

- contest. (Is Rooster too male?)
- Current membership averages 80+ years and we 80+ folks feel we have volunteered enough. Need the new, younger members to step up.
- Delete retirement. If we want to attract younger men retirement in our by-laws may be an impediment.
- Consider scheduling some activities on weekends to make activities more available to nonretirees.
- How do we attract younger members???
- We need to get our brand out to the community so they recognize its benefits. Hire an outside advertising agency? If so, we need a new source of \$\$.
- Change our filing to a 501c3 vs our current filing as a male only organization. If not male only we would be eligible for charitable donations that are tax deductible rather than the current system where we are not tax deductible for grants, therefor doners are less likely to support us. (I think we should first check to see if we have ad expertise among our 8400 members; and if so, see if we can use their expertise. Alternatively, we could ask each member to donate \$5-\$10 for an ad campaign (Again my thoughts).
- Make our mission statement Quality of Life Through Activities-or some such new slogan-no big change in my view
- Change Branches to Chapters so we become Chapter 146. Not a big deal except I was thinking of a new logo as the TREE OF LIFE with the branches representing our activities.

My goal is to ping these issues off of the BEC and now you, the members, and within a week or two send a response to the State as to where Br146 stands on the issues. Your thoughts?? Hit me at John@klueseners.com







During the second Wednesday morning of July, a group of four SIR birders plus 2 spouses explored the Corteva Wetland Pre-

serve heading west from the City of Antioch Marina. This was a fun trip since there is a boardwalk through the middle of the marsh. We spotted and heard 21 species of birds. The highlights of the trip included two White-Tailed kites, a male Northern Harrier, Great-tailed Grackles, and several Marsh Wrens and Common Yellow-Throats (males are a bright yellow warbler with a black face mask). Another exciting highlight were sightings of river otters swimming in the channels. This is a great area to look for otters, the boardwalk was covered with lots and lots of otter scat (poop).

Our next field trip is scheduled for September 11th (2nd Wednesday). We are skipping the August field trip date since birding hits a summer lull and many of our birders will be out of town. Birding really picks up in September as thousands and thousands of birds are migrating south through California. Many of the shorebirds and ducks stop once they reach California, so they can overwinter in our great climate including such songbirds as Yellow-Rumped and Townsend's warblers and our White-Crowned and Golden-Crowned sparrows. Look for details about the September field trip in next month's SIRCall newsletter.



Book Group John Pearl

June to discuss our current selection, The Demon of Unrest: a Saga of Hubris, Heartbreak, and Heroism at the Dawn of the Civil War. by Erik Larson. This book has been No.1

on the Bay Area Nonfiction Best Seller List. We are recommending it.

The book is the story of the people, including Abraham Lincoln, places, and politics of the time period between the election of Mr. Lincoln to the presidency and the very beginning of the Civil War, also called the War Between the States by the people in the Southern states. It starts with the situation at Fort Sumter in November 1860 (with emphasis on its commander. Robert Anderson, a Southerner who was a Unionist) and then discusses the background of Lincoln's rise in Illinois politics, and how the candidates in the presidential election diffused the vote in a way that resulted in Lincoln's victory.

Normally, when we read a book of this nature, it is like reading a history text. But this is one that focuses

on a narrow area in great detail, and reveals much more than what we learned in our history classes. The research done by the author was enormous, with the pictures of the characters fully drawn. I would label some of these characters as important to fully understanding the times even though they may not have made the big decisions. These included Major Anderson; Edmund Ruffin, a Virginian and prominent soil scientist, who was almost insanely focused on secession and who purportedly fired the first shot at Fort

Sumter; and Mary Chesnut, the wife of James Chesnut, a U.S. senator before the war and a Confederate officer during the war, who was a perceptive diarist; and The SIR 146 Book Group met in many others mentioned in supporting roles.

> The President that Lincoln was "relieving" was James. Buchanan, whose main and seemingly overriding wish and need was to leave Washington and return home to Pennsylvania before any hostilities broke out. The book also discusses how Lincoln took the threats to his life prior to the inauguration seriously and employed

> > the Pinkerton Agency to allow him to virtually sneak into Washington at the end of his trip from Illinois, an entrance that later proved to be quite embarrassing..

> > Washington . had some similarities of today, in that while it did not contain much in the way of magnificent monuments and museums or good streets, it was filled with feuding politicians. Then it was the South vs the North in the belief of how the country should be governed and that of states' rights vs direction from the feds. Today, while some of these thoughts are the same in our divided country, it is not the geography that separates us as much as the ideas held about the issues of the day.

> Mr. Lincoln came to town to try to calm the waters of these divides, against slavery, but above all wanting to maintain the Union. The Southerners could point to the Constitution as providing a means for the individual states to secede from the union, which several actually did before Fort Sumter fell. Lincoln nominated a strong cabinet, many of them not in agreement with him. One in particular, William. Seward, thought that he should have been selected as president and not Lin-

coln. And so, while very talented, he was one of many in the cabinet who would often pull in different directions.

Meanwhile, Major Anderson, the commander of Fort Sumter, received either no directions or conflicting directions from Washington and so was unsure of what he should be doing to protect the sole federal asset in Charleston Bay. He had only a small group of officers and men to defend the fort. Including Abner Doubleday, the alleged inventor of baseball. Also, most of the officers of the Confederate army knew and were friends with the fort's defenders, having gone to West Point and/or served with them. Mary Todd Lincoln had two brothers who served in the Confederate army, and this was not an unusual situation among family members on both sides.

South Carolina was a small state but had a lot of the agitators ("fire eaters") who wanted and pushed hard for the separation of the south from the north. Edmund Ruffin, who traveled throughout the south encouraging secession, spent a lot of time agitating in South Carolina because he was angry with his native Virginia's delay of a secession vote..

The book's story is basically the timeline of events with excellent descriptions of them. And as the events came and went, each contributing to the boiling of the pot, the situation became harder to contain. The "main event" happened when the Confederates manning the gun batteries around Charleston harbor told Major Anderson that the deadline for surrendering Fort Sumter had passed, and they opened fire upon the fort. The fort's personnel bravely returned the fire, but they were significantly out-gunned, and after a few days, conditions at the fort finally convinced Major Anderson that the time had come to surrender, as he did in April 1961. The War Between the States, i.e., the Civil War had begun.






