port on this month so we have a special guest columnist filling in for them.



AREA 16 Fishing Report

It is getting colder and rainier, but November proved to be a prolific month for our fishing crew. We started the month with our semi-annual fish fry at **Carl Moyer's** home. 27 mem-

bers ate our fill of fried rockfish and lingcod topped off by brownies prepared by **Carl's** wife, **Marcia**. And we exchanged lots of fish stories, some of which were even true.

And we finished November at our monthly breakfast meeting where **Pedro Contreras** made a presentation about the long-range fishing trip out of San Diego that he, **Brion Beetz, Steve Paulick,** and **Stan Wong** enjoyed. The boat is 105 feet long and there were 23 fishermen aboard. They fished at a spot off the Baja Peninsula that was a two day boat ride from San Diego aboard the *Red Rooster III* and enjoyed gourmet meals along with the great fishing. Pedro described the trip as "mayhem" because they caught lots of big fish, mostly yellowfin tuna and a lesser amount of yellowtail. Pedro caught the largest fish, an 83-pound yellowfin. Unfortunately, he did not join the pool and so the \$400 prize went to another fisherman, whose yellowfin was only one pound less than the one that **Pedro** caught.

Ken Bellindir and **Ron Lew** also had a fun time fishing in Mexico. They traveled to San Jose del Cabo where, among other things, **Ken** landed a 130 lb. marlin while **Ron** boated two very large dorado (also known as mahi mahi).

Stan Wong won the prize for the most fishing outings this month. In addition to his adventure on the longrange fishing trip, he fished for sturgeon three times with some friends off Sherman Island and each time the catch increased. The group caught five fish on the first outing, seven on the second, and eleven on the final trip. The largest fish was six feet long. All the fish were released, because this year's fishing regulations prohibit retention of sturgeon. Stan also caught and released salmon in the San Joaquin River, landed some black bass in Montezuma Slough, and caught trout while fishing from the bank at Shadow Cliffs Reservoir. He also went on what was billed as a combo crabrockfish trip on the Huck Finn. Unfortunately, they did not find any rockfish, but they did pull up some nice crabs. Pedro Contreras and Steve Paulick also tried their hands at crab fishing, but only landed four crabs,

fishing within sight of the Farallon Islands. **Carl Moyer** and **Dennis Lee** did somewhat better, fishing for crabs closer to the mainland and they caught some tasty sand dabs as well.

Shadow Cliffs Reservoir is back as a trout fishing venue. The reservoir had been closed for many months because of an algae accumulation. But the algae has been cleared and the Department of Fish and Wildlife is stocking the reservoir with 1000 lbs. of trout every week. This has come in the nick of time because San Pablo Reservoir, our normal trout fishing location, is on its annual mid-November to mid-February fishing hiatus. However, the results so far have been mixed. Carl Moyer made five trips to Shadow Cliffs. He had no luck fishing from shore, but he and his companions did slightly better fishing from a boat, catching four fish on the best day. But one of his fish weighed five pounds. On another outing in his skiff, he was skunked but **Den**nis Lee, who fished with him, caught one trout. Nevertheless, **Dennis** came home with two trout. That was because a kayak fisherman sailed by and offered up some of his catch. And so Dennis put out his net and had an extra trout for dinner.

Eric Finson went on a camping trip in Henry Coe State

Park but took some time out to fish in the park's lake, where he caught some very nice black bass.

Ron Lew is our resident shark fisherman. Every month he catches a few in the bay and he continued that practice this month.

Tom Kostik caught and released 42 black bass in several outings in the Delta. He also fished in the Delta with Nick Jabuka and Mike Corker and caught some stripers.

Fred McNeil journeyed to Robinson Creek, near Bridgeport in the Eastern Sierra, and did well fishing for trout.



One of the best places to fish in the Bay Area, if one is interested in lots of action, is the Antioch Pier. The pier



Couples Duplicate Bridge 1




Party Bridge Jim Pope and Jim Stedman
