



#### **Birding** Ted Robertson

For our last trip of the year, five SIR birders undertook a leisurely walk around Hidden Lakes Park, located in southern Martinez. During our walk bordering a picturesque lake nestled between

oak trees, we spotted and heard 25 species of birds. There were many highlights, including Orangecrowned and Wilson's warblers, Cedar Waxwings, very close looks at a Western Bluebird, and three species of woodpeckers (Acorn, Nuttall's, and Northern Flicker).

Our next field trip is scheduled for the morning of January 8th (2nd Wednesday) at Contra Loma Reservoir in southern Antioch. Heavy rain cancels or reschedules. All levels of birders are welcome plus I have a few loaner binoculars if you don't own a decent pair. 

It has been cold and rainy all month. But that has not deterred the members of our fishing group. So long as we can avoid the wind, we will fish. The

wind did blow a lot in December, but we did enjoy enough calm days to drop a line or two.

The major activity was what we call a crab combo, where we drop our traps for crab and then fish for rockfish. Lee Clark, Fred McNeil, and Stan Wong all journeyed to the Farallones for limits or near limits, although Fred reported that the seals were just as interested in his lines as the rockfish. Doug Dukes, Carl Moyer, Brion Beetz, Barry Latner, and Steve Paulick also enjoyed limits on crab combo trips in other locations.

On the other hand, trout fishing was quite poor this month. San Pablo Reservoir is closed to fishing until February 14, while Contra Loma and Lafayette Reservoirs were not fishable after rainstorms because of mud accumulation. That left Shadow Cliffs Reservoir as the main attraction for trout fishermen. But it did not produce much this month. **Dennis Lee, Ken Konzak**, and **Carl Moyer** all fished at Shadow Cliffs, but the bite was sparse. Dennis and his son-in-law did try their luck at Los Vaqueros but all they come home with was frostbite.

We also had a first on the Delta. **Tom Kostik** failed to land a single fish on one of his four Delta trips this month. That has not happened to Tom in years. However, his companion, **Harry Sherinian**, landed a keeper striper. Tom did catch a total of 20 stripers on the three other occasions, including five keepers. As his custom, he released all the fish.


