Garden tip of the month: Tulip Bulbs
Ideally a tulip bulb needs a chilling time of at least eight weeks. This gives them necessary amount of dormancy they need for spring growth. To pre-chill put them in the refrigerator for about six weeks (not the freezer). Do not use plastic bags, the bulbs need to breath. Plant as soon as you remove them.

Know Your SIR

Tony DeSalles



Tony DeSalles was born in Cressey, CA (near Merced) on a dairy farm. He is the youngest of seven consecutive brothers followed by two sisters. Tony graduated from Hilmar High School in 1945 where he held the office of Vice President Student Body and President when the current President was called to serve in the

military. After graduating from high school, where he also drove a school bus, he continued on to Modesto Junior College. In 1948 he owned and operated the Green and Gold Restaurant in Hilmar. He married Carol in 1948 whom he met and courted while both were performing in the play Arsenic and Old Lace with a community players group in Turlock, CA. Carol taught grade school while Tony attended San Jose State College. They had three children: a son Jeff who received a BA degree from Sofia University in Tokyo, Japan and two daughters Gayle and Lee Ann, both with BA degrees from Sacramento State. Carol died in 1982 from cancer. In 1985 Tony married Mildred who has a daughter Susan with a Masters degree from Stanford University. While at San Jose State, Uncle Sam required his services during the Korean conflict between 1952-54. He was stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas in the 41st Field Artillery. Tony was assigned to the Allied Liaison Section GZ Division, where he served as a sergeant, Liaison Non Commissioned Officer between Allied Officers and non commissioned officers (except Russian satellite countries). He served as an interpreter (Spanish and Portuguese) and taught classes in English slang. After two years in the army he was employed by the Libby, McNeill and Libby Co. for three years as a retail sales rep. He then joined the Kelly-Clarke Co. Food Brokers in the S.F. Northern California office as a retail sales rep., supervisor, sales manager and eventually a co-owner after nine years. Tony retired after thirty years with this firm when he was 59 years old.

He was active as a baseball and softball umpire (civilian and military) and now enjoys retirement playing golf, bowling, walking and woodwork/crafts.

Tony and Mildred especially enjoy traveling, cruising, mountains, lakes and forests, battlefields and national parks. They derive a great deal of joy from their grandchildren and grand nephews. Equally important, Tony has never met a Branch 146 Sir he didn't like.

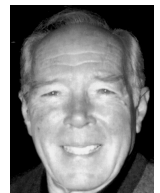

Oiling Your Joints

Can you "oil your joints" like you oil your car? Research from Athens University in Greece and two medical centers in Boston suggest that you can.

Olive oil, which has been shown to be helpful in protecting against cardiovascular disease, may also reduce the risk of rheumatoid arthritis, an autoimmune disease that causes painful crippling and inflammation of the joints. Researchers found the more olive oil consumed, the less occurrence of the disease.

Forgive To Live

Letting bygones be bygones is good for your heart. That's the conclusion of **Kathlene Taylor**, a psychologist with the University of Tennessee. She tracked subjects' blood pressure and heart rates as they discussed being betrayed by a parent, friend, spouse, or lover.

She found that those who had been able to bury the hatchet rather than holding a grudge had lower blood pressures and heart rates.

"Carrying around resentment can take a physical toll" says Taylor. "forgiveness is not only good for your mind - it also seems good for your body."
