- What is it: Every Friday Whole Foods (in Ygnacio Plaza) runs an oyster special... a dozen of the little delights, shelled and ready to slide for \$12. But that is not all. You get a "to go" container, ready, well as the name implies... to go. So...

 - * Whole Foods also has a convenient wine bar with tables (and a huge salad bar if you are so inclined) so you grab your dozen at the seafood counter, head to the express check out (or any other checkout of your choosing) and pay for your little delicacies and head over to the wine bar to find some SIR faces you know.

AREA 16 Fishing Report

We have reported regularly that salmon fishing in California has been banned for the second consecutive year. Consequently, our salmon-starved fishermen traveled this month to other venues to try to catch these tasty fish.

Pete Gates and **Lee Clark** traveled to Vancouver Island in Canada and didn't want to come home. Aside from having delicious meals and great sleeping accommodations at the lodge where they stayed, they brought home 82 lbs. of king salmon plus a few silvers.

They also caught 313 lbs. of ling cod and rockfish, and on the last day of the trip, they caught a 37 lb. halibut. Needless to say, they have already booked the lodge for next year.

Bob Lively flew to Sitka, Alaska for three days of fishing and three days of touring. He limited out on silvers and kings and also fished for black cod. That is a unique experience because black cod are found in waters more than 1000 feet deep and electric reels are often used to catch them. He limited out on the black cod. He also caught some ling cod but released them because ling cod caught in the Sitka area cannot be kept.

Brion Beetz and **Tom Chapman** flew to Seward, Alaska and had a spectacular trip. They caught 130 lbs. of king salmon and rockfish, 230 lbs. of halibut, largely consumed by a 95 lb. behemoth hooked by Brion, and 170 lbs. of ling cod, including a 52 lb. ling cod that **Tom** hooked.

However, not all of us who ventured elsewhere for salmon were successful. **Brion Beetz, Dave Havlik, Gordon Linebaugh** and I took a nine-hour drive to Gold Beach, Oregon to fish at the mouth of the Rogue River. We got a few bites but could not land a single fish in two days of fishing. But the weather was great, and we did have a good time.

Rich Fiscina also did a bit of traveling. It was a vacation trip to Florida, but he had time to catch a bevy of snapper and grouper while the rest of his family enjoyed the beaches.

However, even with salmon fishing being unavailable, there are still lots of species to catch in California and we did our share.

Carl Moyer and **Ken Bellindir** launched Carl's boat from Pacifica where they limited on halibut and caught four ling cod. On other trips, Carl limited on rockfish fishing off Pescadero Beach; limited on rockfish and ling cod out of Pacifica; and limited on halibut fishing on the Pacific Pearl.

Steve Paulick and **Ben La Sala** limited on landlocked salmon in Lake Berryessa. Landlocked salmon are not part of the state ban. They are smaller than the salmon we catch in the ocean and, unlike ocean salmon that return to the rivers where they were born in order to spawn, landlocked salmon never leave the lake in which they were born or planted.

Mike Corker and **Tom Kostik**, our Delta experts, landed and released 68 black bass on several trips. **Phil Scimonelli** watched his wife outfish him on the Antioch Pier, fishing for stripers. **Joe Miscione** sailed his boat into Spoonbill Bay, an arm of the Delta, where he first picked up several catfish and then finished with stripers.

Our next two meetings will be on August 22 and September 26 at the Legends Bar and Grill, at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway, in Concord. You are welcome to join us, even if you have never fished or have not fished in a long time. The meetings begin at 8:30 am but come earlier for breakfast (beginning at 7 am) for camaraderie and fish stories.

If you have an interest in participating in this hiking activity, please let me know and I will add your email address to my distribution list.



Book Group John Pearl

The SIR 146 Book Group met in July and reviewed our book of the month, James, by Percival Everett, an English professor at USC.



Twain and the account of his trip on the Mississippi, want to do. James retells Huckleberry Finn from the perspective of Jim, the Slave who joins Huck on the trip. The book identifies him as "James" and so we will refer to him by that name in this review.

were mostly slaves, and therefore property, or chattel.

James was a slave, had a family and they lived in what we would probably call a shack. Instead of being a passive, dialect-laden character, James is transformed into a complex, articulate individual whose voice resonates with a powerful blend of wit, irony, and searing indictment. Indeed, virtually all of the slaves who appear in the novel speak in the same manner and when they come into contact with whites, they "translate" into the language that the whites expect. It is the author's way of showing that the slaves were human be-

ings, not chattel.

The novel follows James's journey to freedom, but through a lens that is both familiar and radically different. James's use of speech is a constant performance, speaking the dialect given him by Mark Twain when speaking to most whites, and with nearly perfect English with fellow slaves or individuals who did not consider him to be chattel.

James sets out on the raft after he learns that Miss Watson, his owner, intends to sell him and separate him from his family. Huck joins James on the raft and they attempt to sail off to freedom for Jim and a better life for Huck in the north, and along the way they meet a lot different people, all the while running scared from people who chase and catch slaves for the reward. Sometimes they are together and sometimes apart, but always manage to get back together at some point in their travels. Huck has no worries about being "caught," as he is white and a free person.

Some readers might be upset because all the white characters met in the journey are racist to some degree and treat the black characters badly, because they are thought to be slaves or former slaves and therefore inferior. But that was the tenor of the times. The whites had the power and used it. Blacks seemed Most of us are familiar with Huckleberry Finn by Mark to exist only to do the work that white folks didn't

James's motive was to get back to St. Petersburg, reconnect with his family, and leave to find a safe haven for them, either in a free state or even in Canada. However getting back to St. Petersburg was not easy. Mis- the steamboat on which they happen to catch a ride souri was a slave state, and blacks who lived there blows up (a true event), and in another example when James runs from a minstrel band where he was a member of the chorus after he realizes that the owner/ leader of the band, who purportedly abhorred slavery, nevertheless is treating him like a slave. He had been hoping to make enough money to buy freedom for his family. His whole trip is spent either in hiding or in running. James is something of an escape artist, as he shifts between personas from the subservient slave to the cunning escape artist, all told in the first person. Huck is a pretty good guy, playing a strong supporting

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James and Huck carefully make their way home and slip into the slave quarters in the early darkness, and then discover things are not as they had left them. As they near James' house, he tells Huck to head on home, but Huck insists on staying with James. James' family is not there, and the house is occupied by other slaves, whom he does not know. This is a major shock. James quickly learns that wife and daughter were taken by the local overseer. After sleeping at his former house, he hides out at Jackson Island in the river where he and Huck had spent time before heading out on their journey. He finds the overseer drunk on the island kills him and sends his body floating down the river in retribution for a rape James had witnessed earlier. Nevertheless, the book ends on an upward note. James learns that his family is being held on a breeding farm where they are being mistreated. He goes to the farm and, after setting a fire to part of the premises, he is able to free his family and four other slaves being held there, but not before he kills the owner of the farm when the owner tries to stop him. From there, they head for the hills, i.e., north to either a Free State or Canada.
